

# WIS2552 Biodiversity Conservation: Global Perspectives

Spring Semester, 2025 Online Asynchronous Format, 3-Credits

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# Course Description

The course is designed for students who wish to gain a global perspective of biodiversity patterns and issues. Students will learn about the origin, structure and measurement of biodiversity; the biology of species of different kingdoms; and patterns in species' distributions.

## **Course Prerequisites**

There are no prerequisite courses, requisite hours, or existing credentials required for enrollment in this course. This course is designed to accommodate all students, regardless of their prior knowledge or experience in the subject area. Students are encouraged to be self-directed and take responsibility for their learning. While no specific background is necessary, the following attributes and skills will enhance your success in the course:

# **Course Learning Objectives**

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- After completing this course, students will be able to explain fundamental concepts and scientific principles of conservation, including genetics and ecology, and describe global patterns in biodiversity, both phylogenetic and geographical.
- After completing this course, students will be able to identify and interpret the evolutionary basis for the five-kingdom system of phylogeny and evaluate biological issues involving species from all five kingdoms.

- After completing this course, students will be able to analyze future biodiversity challenges and the role of human intervention in mitigating these challenges.
- Develop the ability to critically engage with and evaluate complex wildlife conservation issues, applying analytical thinking, evidence-based reasoning, and collaborative discussion techniques to contribute to informed, solution-oriented dialogues.

## **Learning Materials and Supplies**

This course has no required textbooks for purchase. To ensure the affordability of course materials, we have carefully selected resources that are both high-quality and cost-effective for students. Our course has been awarded the Spring 2024 Affordable UF Badge for our efforts to minimize costs for students. WIS 2552 was also awarded Exemplary course through the University of Florida's internal online course review process.

Packback: The primary tool we will use for class discussions is Packback, an Al-assisted
discussion platform. This tool enhances student engagement and learning through dynamic
discussions. You will be charged a fee of \$39 for access to Packback, payable the first time you
log onto the platform through the Canvas course link.



## Instructor Interaction Plan

- **Email and Canvas Messages:** Expect a response to your emails and Canvas messages within 24 hours during weekdays. I encourage you to plan ahead and not wait until the weekend to complete assignments, as response times may be slower over the weekend.

# Required Technology & How to Obtain the Technology

To successfully participate in and complete this course, you will need access to specific technology and resources. Below is a detailed list of required technology and how to obtain them:

- **Computer and Internet:** You will need a reliable computer and a stable internet connection. This includes a method for output audio (speakers / headphones). This is essential for accessing course materials, submitting assignments, and participating in discussions. - Packback: We will use Packback, an AI-assisted discussion tool, as our primary platform for class discussions. You will be charged a fee of \$39 for access to Packback, payable the first time you log onto the platform through the Canvas course link. More information on Packback can be found here.

Each week, you will be asked to:

- Ask one new question about the course material that meets the community's minimum. Curiosity Score of 75 points (rated based on Presentation, Credibility, and Effort).
- Answer the professor posted question and at least one student posted question. Your response post needs to meet the community's minimum Curiosity Score of 75 points (rated based on Presentation, Credibility, and Effort).

Criteria: Points will be assigned on quality of content; questions and answers that meet the Curiosity Score minimums (75 points for questions, 75 points for answers) will receive full credit. Half credit will be assigned to those posts and answers that fall below 75 curiosity points. However, you should be aware that the community is moderated, and posts will be removed if they are not on-topic with the course material or if they substantially replicate a response previously made by another student. You will receive zero credit if your post is removed, either for being off-topic or for any other reason (e.g. if it is flagged for plagiarism, disrespectfulness towards others, etc.), but you have the opportunity to edit and repost for a chance at credit.

# **Student Privacy Disclaimer:**

For online course with recorded materials a statement informing students of privacy related issues such as: Our class sessions may be audio visually recorded for students in the class to refer back and for enrolled students who are unable to attend live.
