Course Description: This course introduces the natural history, management, and restoration process of the Greater Everglades Ecosystem. The Everglades is internationally recognized as one of the world's most unique natural and cultural resources, but how much do Floridians know about this amazing ecosystem? The Greater Everglades encompasses ~ 4 million acres and is the focus of the world's largest intergovernmental watershed restoration effort.

Course Goal: The goal of this class is to provide students with a broader understanding of the Greater Everglades Ecosystem and the complexity associated with the restoration effort. We will use a combination of lectures, readings, discussions, and a hands-on field trip to the Everglades to accomplish this goal.

Course Objectives: Specific objectives are for students to be able to:

- 1. Describe historical and current Everglades ecosystem processes
- 2. Summarize Everglades natural history and ecology
- 3. Explain what the restoration effort entails
- 4. Evaluate how fauna and flora help evaluate the restoration process
- 5. Describe and assess how ecological resources are monitored and managed
- 6. Discuss the socio-ecological complexity to restoration
- 7. Examine why restoration is still important in the face of climate change

Recommended, but optional, textbook: *Lodge, T.E. and S.E. Davis. 2023. The Everglades Handbook: understanding the ecosystem, 5th edition. CRC Press.* Available on Amazon and other booksellers. This book is the most comprehensive text written on the Everglades. It was first published in 1994 and is now in its 5th edition. Previous editions have very good information, but, of course, the most recent one is best. If I assign a reading from this book, I will make it available on Canvas.

Course format: Monday and Wednesday class periods will have a lecture and will also rely heavily on student participation. The Friday period is dedicated to media pieces, readings, and discussion. Our small class size will allow us to have group discussions and active learning activities, both in class or online. We also have a field trip through the Greater Everglades Watershed during spring break (see more info below)

Readings: Readings will be assigned and available on canvas and should be completed prior to each class period.

Quizzes: We will have approximately 6 in-class quizzes that will cover previous material or readings selected for that day's class period.

Media/discussion piece: Each week, one student will be assigned with finding a recent (preferably within the last year) media piece, blog post, video, or discussion topic related to the Everglades and will post that information on the discussion tab in canvas. We'll discuss each piece as a group on Fridays.

Individual presentations: Each student in the course will select their own topic of interest (related to the Everglades) and give a 15-minute presentation during the last section of the semester (see schedule on last page). Students can choose the topic at any point in the first part of the course, but should have selected their topic by 26 March (Wed after the field trip). Students will also peer review (respectfully) each other's presentations.

Take-home Exam: Students will have a take-home (open book/open notes) exam at the end of the semester. For this exam, *you* write and answer your own open ended short-essay questions. You can prepare for this exam all through the semester – write down questions that occur to you during class, and that you think are designed for synthesizing the information learned during the semester. Students must work alone.

Field Trip: Each student is required to attend the spring break field trip to the Greater Everglades Ecosystem. The tentative dates for this field trip are the entirety of spring break, Sunday 16 March through Sunday 23 March. Housing will vary depending on the location, we will be staying in dorms or field housing.

This field trip will allow for an immersive experience into the Everglades, for you to see the ecosystems, meet biologists and land managers, and participate in some field methods. For this trip, you should bring proper field clothes and supplies. We will provide a full list in class. You should also be prepared to go the field in inclement weather including, but not limited to, excessive heat or cold, rain, or wind. And of course, since it is the Everglades, be ready for mosquitoes!! During the field trip, the group will be eating inexpensively and attempt to stay in inexpensive lodging. The estimated cost to individual students will be approximately \$200 for lodging and will need to bring some of their own food. If this cost is a financial hardship, we have options available so that no one misses this opportunity!

Participation and attendance: Attendance and participation in class and the field trip are an essential part of succeeding in this course. Participation points will be given for asking/answering questions, expressing opinions, and otherwise physically and verbally engaging in discussions. Attendance will be taken for each class period because participation is such an important part of the course. If you miss 3 class periods, you will receive 50% of the participation points you have accrued. In addition, if you are late for more than 3 classes, you will also lose 50% of your participation points (please come talk to me if you have a course right before that could affect your timeliness). If you are either late or miss more than 4 class periods, you will receive no participation points.

Behavior in class: Students are required to be professional in all facets of this course. Disruptive or rude behavior will not be tolerated. I reserve the right to remove anyone from class or the field trip if they do not conduct themselves in a professional manner. If you are removed from an activity, you will not receive any credit associated with it. I consider texting, talking while others are speaking, surfing the web, mocking other students, and inappropriate comments all grounds for dismissal from class.

Plagiarism: Plagiarism: As commonly defined, plagiarism consists of passing off as one's own the ideas, words, writing etc., which belong to another. As per UF Honor Code (see

Academic Honesty below): A student shall not represent as the student's own work all or any portion of the work of another. Plagiarism includes but is not limited to:

- 1. Quoting oral or written materials including but not limited to those found on the internet, whether published or unpublished, without proper attribution.
 - a. Note that quoting material is reserved for very specific occasions when the way something was originally written is essential to its meaning. In all other cases, quoting, even if a citation is provided, is inappropriate. This applies to the textbook, and concepts/definitions from the textbook should never be copied word-for-word.
- 2. Submitting a document or assignment which in whole or in part is identical or substantially identical to a document or assignment not authored by the student even If permission from the original author was granted.
- 3. Copying answers word for word directly from textbook or the internet, or other resources including other classmates.

Canvas has some handy applications for faculty to determine whether plagiarism or cheating has occurred. Plagiarism is one of the worst academic sins, for the plagiarist destroys the trust among colleagues without which research cannot be safely communicated. Plagiarism will not be tolerated in this course. Offenders of this policy will be punished according to University policies. Cheating of any type will also not be tolerated in this course.
